Abstract

The topic of this dissertation deals with the religious and administrative titles of the officials of theanimals cemetery at Tuna el-Gebalthroughoutthe demoticdocuments.

Tuna el-Gebel is the name of a modern village, located on the edge of the western desert, near the modern town of Mallawi (Minya governorate). It contains many important monuments but this study focuses on the animal cemetery which is devoted for the burial of the sacred animals incorporating birds, especially the Ibis and the Baboon. The excavations at Tuna el-Gebel necropolis have revealed a religious association which served as living and working areas at the same time for the members of the cult community. Many of Demotic documents have found inside the Tune el-Gebel necropolis. It can be observed through these documents that this association was managed by a number of the officials. For instance wab.w+Hwtyand stm.waS were responsible for collecting the dead sacred Ibises from different places in order to bring them to their burying place at Tuna El-Gebel. A general (pAmrmSa) was responsible for the safe transfer of Ibises from El-Fayoum region to Tuna el-Gabel. **sX+Hwty**was responsible for receiving the dead Ibises and Baboons from the servants (sDm-aS) and registering their numbers. While TAynA .ntr.wwere incharge of transporting the sacred animal mummies from the place of embalming to the necropolis (fromwabtto pAa.wy-htp)

The introduction: Included the aims of the study, previous study, and procedure scope.

<u>Chapter Three</u>: deals with the administrative titles that were held by the officials at Tuna el-Gebel necropolis.
